WINTERIZING THE CLASSIC



Long term maintenance is an essential requirement of classic or collector car ownership. Yes, we all enjoy the summer cruise along the lake shore, the spirited run in a rally with a trusted navigator, or even just a leisurely drive with the top down to the local supermarket to fetch a few groceries. What better way is there to arrive at the relative's pool party or the cottage? You instantly rekindle the romantic mood of yester–year when the sun glistens off the sleek waxed fenders and the admiring glances of passers–by create an instant feel–good mood.

There comes a time however, for the more mundane tasks of upkeep. You may not mind the annual chat with the insurance agent or a good chin wag while your trusted mechanic or a good buddy and you go over a few things together. This is part of the joy; discussing the year's mechanical upkeep or modification, the annual trips to certain race venues or perhaps even the long promised cross-country trek, probably with a convoy to a regional event or international meet.

What few of us enjoy however is the end of season 'tuck into bed' for the long hibernation! Not only is it the end of the fun for four or five dreary, cheerless months but it actually requires some work and careful planning. Some club members have a routine and checklist. Unless you enjoy impromptu curb-side repairs and instant restoration tasks, or 'Immediate Mid-trip Mechanical Assessment and Intervention' activity, please take this ritual seriously.

There are some points for discussion, just like there usually are with any ordinary maintenance. Almost everyone has a way of doing things or personal reason for their special procedure, but over the years I've learned a few things. And I would say that, with the knowledge filtered from a lot of reading and insight gained from a lot experience which has been shared amongst the club members over the years, I have a worthwhile set of guidelines to offer.

Ideally, you want a secure indoor spot for your baby. Does a wooden barn count? If it is not in danger of collapse, then ok, is it dry and rodent–free? These are essential! Consider the floor very carefully as many rural old barns allow massive amounts of moisture to attack the undersides of vehicles parked for the winter. Heavy duty plastic sheeting may be helpful with this issue and may be a worthwhile investment if a more moisture– proof structure is unavailable. I have even seen this tip recommended for concrete floors!

Tire pressure? Very easy: you can inflate these when you fill up the gas tank then drive home the last few miles at 40 lbs. The over-inflation is to prevent flat spots. Should the car be stored on jacks? This suggestion was made a few years ago, but having read through several magazines from classic car clubs or modern enthusiasts' news sheets, I would suggest that, unless you have been stationed overseas and will be away for more than a year, the 'take the weight off the springs' deal might be overkill.

Now the most important lesson I've learned: the oil MUST be changed at the end of the season – even if you have done only a thousand miles! The combustion process does pollute the oil in your crankcase and leaving it there to be stored till the spring will result in acid etching of your crank-shaft and assorted other parts. Skimping on a few cans of oil really **IS** false economy.

One question that is debated by many is the frequency of a warm-up run while being stored. The routine used to be to start and run the engine for 20 to 30 minutes every week or two. However, the effect of this warm up and cool down with no real travel is to generate condensation which is severely detrimental to the life of the exhaust system and even to the fresh oil that you just put in the crankcase. I would feel far more comfortable to simply treat the fuel system with a bottle of Sta-bil gas treatment, block the tail pipe and air intake with a rag or plastic bag to keep critters out of the rear and air-intake under the bonnet.

Read the instructions for correct details but when adding the can of Sta-bil to the fuel tank, drive it home from the gas station to circulate it through your carbs, or if it is too far from the gas station, add it at the bottom of the driveway. ESPECIALLY nowadays, check the ethanol content of your final top-up. Higher octane grades have less ethanol and Shell, I believe has the least. Save fuel lines and other vulnerable components. This is another reason why I do not like the start and warm up routine. Seal things and let them lie dormant for four months.

Little creatures can also create havoc with your new upholstery and padding material so read about keeping the fourlegged friends outside the passenger compartment. Moth balls were often considered but now they are hard to find. An accepted alternative might be the antistatic dryer sheets that we toss in with our sweaters and the wife's delicates try it. I have not used it yet but I have seen the tip on several classic car sites.

About critters, mice, etc., if you have a two car suburban garage and park the Hyundai or Toyota there every night then you probably do not need to pay too much attention to four legged creatures but if you seal things up tight for five months then a strategically placed set of mousetraps may be a good investment. O NOT put them in the car as a decaying carcass on your carpet is not what you want to discover while waiting for April showers to wash away the last of the city road salt!

Batteries should be removed and stored in a dry, indoor spot like your basement, but not on the concrete floor. Unless your car has a selection of computer monitored gimos, the need for constant trickle charging is unnecessary. our clock that was built and installed as a luury

Now the final details do not engage the handbrake If you think she might be inclined to roll, then a set of wooden blocks should be sufficient to prevent any catastrophe. aise the top and windows to keep your interior free from uninvited suburban mice. Keep your cloth top stretched in the up position for the duration of the storage session. Get proper help if your top is only raised for storage. There is no need to lose your temper at a friendly neighbor if he has never erected your top before, or to end the season with another scratch on the rear deck.

And yet, the biggest catastrophe might be unforeseen. Watch where and how you store the family bicycles, and summer lawn chairs, patio furniture, the lawn mower and art supplies that you rescued from a friend's basement. Ceiling hooks save ground space, but..... please..... hopefully you do not have to go around the car too often to look for your carpentry tools in the dark on a chilly winter night That is an organizational issue and others may be more ualified than me for dispensing that kind of advice

Finally, do not forget to lock the garage Leaving your baby unprotected while you make an etended trip to the cottage or etend your Florida sojourn could result in a total loss in the middle of a cold night when neighbours are away too. Car thieves operate yearround, and our most pried possession is susceptible to theft if there is any suspicion that the homeowners or garage lessee is away.

Ever wonder where the expression 'Safety Fast' originated? As a relatively new member to the club I was curious and turned to a Google for an answer. The following article seems to be the consensus which I borrowed from MG Driver's Club. -Marilyn

Safety Fast! First appeared in the Octagon Newsletter ... January/February 1988

Known all over the world as the "Slogan" of M.G. Car Co. Ltd., Abingdon on Themes, but how many people know how such an apt description of the car came into being. I will enlighten those who have never thought about it.

In the early days at Abingdon the "Sales and Publicity" were run by three people ... Bill Mussel, Ted Colgrove (Salesmen) and George Tuck (Publicity). Around the early and middle twenties, cars were equipped with rear brakes only. The main reason being that braking systems were rod operated. It was not until Bowden Cables were introduced, was it easy to equip cars with front wheel brakes. A difficult operation due to the front wheels continuous steering angle changes.

As cars performance increased it became necessary to improve their stopping distances. Hence the introduction of "Four Wheel Brakes". In order to warn fellow motorists, that their cars were so equipped, such cars carried a red triangle at the rear, mounted around the rear number plate illuminating lamp, so that it was conspicuous at night. During the late twenties, early thirties, Clayton De Wandre brought out a Vacuum Servo brake. The Oxford Bus Companies passenger carrying vehicles were so equipped. In addition to the red triangle displayed at the rear, was the warning "Servo Brakes Keep Your Distance ... Safety First". In some cases the wording was proceeded by "This Bus Is Equipped With Servo Brakes".

One of the salesmen, Bill Mussel, I think, was driving to work one morning, trapped behind such a bus in Oxford main streets, no by-passes then. Bill went through the usual time wasting tricks of reading all the adverts and converting registration numbers into possible card game hands, imagining a hole card or turn up. When Bill arrived at the office later he said to his colleagues, "Some of those Oxford Buses should have "Safety Last" written on the rear the way some of them are driven, not "Safety First". "Ah nova" said George Tuck, "'Safety First', 'Safety Last' how about 'Safety Fast' for M.G.?

TECHNICAL SUPPORT

RANDY'S TECHNICAL SESSION AT THE JANUARY MEETING

Randy discussed thermostats and heater valves and handed out information sheets on each. He compared an old original thermostat to a newer style thermostat. He also had on hand a normal heater valve and a replacement that is made of pot metal instead of aluminum as the original valve had been. He discussed movement of the heater valve lever and what it does. He also discussed how the thermostats work and why they are important.

TECH TIP... From Steve Budra: MGB (and other LBCs) Engine Removal

Here's a tech tip for removing the engine or engine/transmission combo on an MGB. Despite recommendations to use the MGBs protruding valve cover studs as fixing points for an engine hoist, I've never really been comfortable doing it – the studs just seem to flimsy. Recently, I rented a hoist locally but the brackets on the supplied chain were sort of J-shaped. When I attached them to the studs and began to lift the engine/transmission as a unit, the studs bent and finally snapped. Luckily, the engine was only a couple inches off its mounts at the time. Other than the studs (which I later replaced), there was no damage from the fall.

Looking for a better solution, I found two more substantial fixing points: one is the top mounting bolt on the alternator bracket – tapped into the right side of the engine block. The other is the left engine plate bolt which is tapped into the top rear of the block. These are 3/8" diameter bolts. I recommend substituting the original bolts with longer ones to give you enough space for the hoist bracket and washers, replacing them with the originals when you are done. The rest of the operation went smoothly and I felt much more comfortable with 600-700 pounds relying on these bolts. The only drawback is the engine is tilted a little to one side when lifted, but one person working the hoist and another rotating the engine a little will make it work. You could also install an adjustable tilt lift between the hoist and engine which allows you to fine-tune the angles. TECH TIP from Rob Crissinge: Simple Emergency Bonnet Release.

As a preventative measure on MGs and other makes with similar hood release mechanisms – a simple emergency release can be rigged up with two Zip Ties. One is looped tightly at the lever, and the other longer one is looped through it. The long end is tucked into a convenient (easy to reach) spot behind the grill. If the hood release cable ever lets go and you really need to get under the hood, simply fish it out – give it a tug, and open pops the hood!
